Looking at the Water Rates.



Recently increased water rates are step increases to a funding amount required by

Rural Development. Rural Development is the federal assistance program that dispenses grants and low interest loans to communities undertaking large infrastructure projects, such as the Talent - Phoenix - Medford water intertie.

The step increases are based on a required water rate study which a licensed water engineering firm did for the city. But after a summer of some sky-high water bills and many angry customers, the City Administrator and City Council are requesting the engineers use a different methodology for the rate analysis.

The step increase scheduled for this autumn has been canceled.

The reality of the situation won't change with a new rate analysis. Talent's water users are going to have to pay more for water than they have in the past. That's not only because we're in the process of buying an abundance of clean water from Big Butte Springs, but because water rates in Talent were never high enough to pay the freight for a water system's operation and maintenance.

The way to make the most of this new situation is to be a \$mart water user.

Monitor and Reduce.

Read your own meter periodically, weekly if there are many users in your household. Keeping track of usage will alert you to inground or indoor leaks. It can also let you know if someone is using more water than they need by letting water run unnecessarily. Talent's Water Clerk, Melissa Munn, has information about how to read your meter. Call her at City Hall, Monday through Friday, 8:30-5.

Melissa also has tons of information about how to use less water without feeling water deprived and she has <u>FREE</u> water conservation kits that, if used, will help save money. Those kits and water conservation information will be available at the Harvest Festival, Sept. 12.


