



Good News for Talent School Kids

The West Main Street/Wagner Creek Road area is about to get a lot safer for school kids and residents. Public Works Director Tim Dedrick has received a commitment of grant funds to build sidewalks and bike lanes along West Main from the railroad tracks to West Street and along Wagner Creek Road from West Street to Schoolhouse Road.



Elementary and Middle School neighborhood residents and other interested citizens are invited to comment on plans for sidewalks and bike lanes in the school area. We want to work with the neighbors to develop a design that protects neighborhood character while developing safe, efficient transportation opportunities.

The City has grant funding for one half of the project this fiscal year, and will complete the project next year. The money is from the Oregon Department of Transportation: Bicycle and Pedestrian Program. We were awarded the grant in January, and the first \$50,000 became available on July 1st. Surveying and planimetry for the project have been completed, so we have accurate maps of property features such as property lines and the locations of buildings and trees near the right-of-way.

Please join us on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>August 3</u>, <u>1999 at 6:30 p.m.</u> in Talent's Community Hall to share your ideas for this important project. Information such as safety issues, the condition and value of individual trees, physical or historic features of the area that we should be aware of, and other issues that may affect the phasing of the project will all be useful as the City develops final plans for this project. Helmet Ordinance passed!

Ordinance No. 99-669-0, Section 19 states that any person operating a skateboard, bicycle, in-line skate, or other such device to control speed or movement while at the Skatepark or BMX park shall use protective headgear of a type approved under ORS 815.052 for bicycle helmets. The Ordinance passed unanimously at the July 21,1999

New Flood Maps in 2000



The Federal Emergency Management Agency has awarded the City of Talent a flood plain mapping grant. Wagner Creek will be one of only three drainage basins in the state that will be the subject of a

detailed flood plain study in fiscal year 2000! The project as planned will assess about three miles of the creek from Bear Creek, possibly as high as Ashland Mine Road. The allocation for the project is about \$70,000 and the upper limit of the study area will be determined by how far the agency can make that amount stretch. Nancy Kincaid has been working closely with FEMA and Oregon Emergency Management the last 2½ years to develop strategies to reduce flood hazards in Talent. All that hard work has paid off with this new federal recognition of our local commitment to effective flood plain management.

Thank you to the Talent Boys and Girls Club!

They scoured the area armed with trash bags and work gloves and even picked up trash along the railroad tracks. Wow, what a job they did! Use Water Wisely...

In the summer, each of us uses about 250 gallons of water a day – that's more than twice what we use in the winter. And research suggests much of that extra use is simply wasted.

Water conservation is not just for emergencies. Water conservation today saves you money on your next water bill, reduces the cost for developing new supplies, and leaves more water in the rivers for fish and habitat.

When the heat of summer is upon us, we tend to water our yards and lawns more frequently. With increased outdoor water usage comes an increased water bill. Here a few tips to help you conserve water outdoors:

- When landscaping, choose the right plants. Buy plants that are low-water users.
- Consider replacing turf with ground covers such as junipers or heathers.
- Group high-water use plants and water them together by area.
- Avoid oscillating sprinklers they tend to over-water at the ends when they reverse direction. Instead, choose a good stationary sprinkler or soil soaker that will water a large area evenly.
- Check hoses for leaks and replace washers in hose connectors.
- Keep your lawn in good shape. Keep weeds down as they rob your lawn and plants of nutrients and water.
- Mow your lawn regularly to the height recommended for the type of grass you have. Leave the clippings on the lawn as mulch if they aren't thick and matted.
- Cultivate the soil in planted beds regularly so water can penetrate and develop a good root system.
- Use mulch in rows and around plants to maintain moisture.
- Depending on the weather, it's generally better to water about once a week and provide 1 inch to 1 1/2 inches of water. (If it's hot, you might have to water more often.)
- Water early in the morning before 10 a.m. Watering in the heat of the day allows the water to evaporate and watering late in the day may promote fungus and other lawn diseases.


