



The Finance and Administration Department of the City of Talent received a Certificate of Achievement for excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers' Association. Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management.

How to use your placard

If you have been issued a Disabled Persons Parking Permit, then you are permitted to park in reserved or marked disabled parking spaces. These spaces are reserved so disabled persons can have easier access to the entrance of a facility or building. The striped area next to or between the disabled parking spaces, known as pages spices, are for disabled persons that we wheel chairs or other devices peed



as access aisles, are for disabled persons that use wheel chairs or other devices needing more room to exit and enter their vehicle. The law prohibits a handicap space to be blocked for any reason. This includes vehicles, signs, shopping carts, fences, promotion displays, etc. Disabled parking laws are enforced 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, including holidays.

If a disabled persons placard is registered to you (identified by your driver's license number), you may use it in any vehicle you use and may park in any disabled space if your placard is displayed properly. You are in violation if you use a placard which was not issued for your use. Your placard is for your use only. Each disabled person needs to obtain their own placard unless the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) issues a family placard. Disabled Parking spaces may not be used by anyone without a placard for "just a minute" while running into a building, to unload a vehicle or use the ATM.

A new placard must be obtained from the DMV when legibility becomes difficult. Do not deface your placard by trying to mark over the faded dates. Parking patrols will issue a warning or citation if they cannot read the expiration date on your placard.

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Fire Prevention Week

October 3-9, 1999

If you do not already have a plan of what to do in the event of a fire, take time during this week to put one together. If you don't know where to start, stop by Jackson County Fire District Five (716 S. Pacific Highway) on Tuesday, October 5th at 7 p.m. for their open house. With di-



rection from Smokey Bear and Sparky the Fire Dog, they'll help you plan your "great escape." Tour the fire station and get your kids involved in escape training. If you'd like to practice fire prevention right away, here are a few tips from the National Fire Protection Association:

Make a Home Fire Escape Plan

Don't wait. Sit down with every member of your household and make an escape plan today.

- Draw a map of your home. Show every room, door and window.
- Mark an easy way out of each room, then find a second way out.
- Mark every way out of your home so you know how to get out of the building no matter where you are.
- Pick an outside place in front of your home where everyone will meet after they've escaped.

Practice Your Plan

Getting out of your own home sounds easy, but your home can look very different if it's full of smoke. So practice your plan.

Plan and Practice Fire Drills

Sparky the Fire Dog wants you to know what to do if there is a fire in your home. Smoke alarms make a loud noise to tell you when there's a fire. Learn the sound your smoke alarm makes. Anytime

you hear the alarm, go outside immediately!

Escape Tips:

1) You can't hide from a fire!

Never try to hide from a fire. Follow your escape plan to get out, and then stay out.

2) Crawl under smoke!

If you see any smoke when you are escaping, try another way out. If you have to escape through smoke, crawl on your hands and knees with your head 1 to 2 feet above the floor. The air will be the cleanest, coolest and safest there.

3) Don't stop!

When you hear a smoke alarm, leave the building immediately. Don't try to save anything. Go to your meeting place and wait for other members of your household. Never go back into a burning building.

The society members are a group of avid birders who work together to protect our environment and conserve natural habitats.
