Talent welcomes Meghan Mac Kenzie – its new RARE participant & Assistant City Planner

Meghan Mac Kenzie comes to the City of Talent through the RARE (Resource Assistance for Rural Economies) program and will be working with the City for one year. She is originally from Newtown, Connecticut, where her father was involved in local politics. She was introduced to the world of community development at an early age and "fell in love with it."

Meghan moved to southern Oregon one year after graduating from Southern Connecticut State University with a Bachelor of Sciences degree in History. As a recent member of REAL Corps (an Americorps program affiliated with Southern Oregon University), she was a crew leader and the Natural Resource Education program coordinator. Some of her accomplishments with the program include riparian area restoration, designing a wetlands curriculum, fuel break maintenance, pre-commercial thinning, prescribed burns, cutting and maintaining trails, and improving fish habitat at Applegate Lake.

When asked what she will be doing here in Talent, Meghan responded, "This year I will be finishing the application for Talent to become a Tree City USA. I will provide the city with an energy and environment element of the Comprehensive Plan and I'll be working on the Wagner Creek Greenway. I am very excited about my new position and I look forward to meeting all of you throughout the year."

Let's make **Halloween** safe for kids

Halloween may be a fun time of year for kids, but for parents, trick-or-treat time can be a little tricky. To make Halloween a treat for all, follow these safety tips advised by the National Crime Prevention Council:

Make sure your kids dress up safely

Check that the costumes are flame-retardant so the little ones aren't in danger near burning jack-o-lanterns and other fire hazards.

Keep costumes short to prevent trips, falls, and other bumps in the night.

Try make-up instead of a mask. Masks can be hot and uncomfortable and, more importantly, they can obstruct a child's vision – a dangerous thing when kids are crossing streets and going up and down steps.

Make sure kids wear light colors or put reflective tape on their costumes.

transportation and utilities, it is time to determine how we will accommodate future growth.

The Oregon Planning Goals require cities to have enough land in their Urban Growth Boundaries to provide a twenty year supply of land for growth. Talent must plan for a roughly 2% annual growth rate. The first step to figure out whether we need to expand our growth boundary is to determine how much land is already available for residential development, and then decide how much more land, if any, will be needed.

The state Goals also require cities to provide for a variety of housing types, including low-income, single-family, and multi-family housing. Talent provides low and moderate income housing at a higher rate than most cities in Southern Oregon. We need to agree as a city about what mix of housing types we will need in the future. That will help us understand our land needs for housing, and whether we will need to expand the Urban Growth Boundary (UGB).

Our existing UGB, adopted in 1981, creates a future residential area south and west of the railroad. Our Comprehensive Plan also describes an "Area of Future Growth" west of the designated UGB area. This future growth area made sense when it was established because it is an area with quite a bit of residential development already, and because it fits next to the existing boundary in a way that would create a compact town form. A town form that is more or less square is easier to serve with utilities and streets, and is easier to navigate by foot or bike. Once we determine whether we need additional land for residential growth, we can consider whether the existing future growth area is still our best choice. The state Goals limit our ability to grow into other areas because most of the surrounding area is zoned for farm use, and is protected from development.
