Down by the Riverside

On Saturday, May 20th, 2000, volunteers from all over the state will work together to improve and protect the waterside spaces they love best by participating in Down by the Riverside -Enhancement, Cleanup and Appreciation Day. As part of the state-wide event, the City of Talent and Stop Oregon Litter Vandalism (SOLV) have coordinated a cleanup day right here in Talent. Starting at 9 a.m. on Saturday the 20th, a team of volunteers will gather at Lynn Newbry Park to help remove litter and debris from Bear Creek and along the Greenway. Last year, more than 2,100 people from all over the state participated in this event and removed almost 135,000 pounds of debris and completed countless restoration projects.

If you are interested in coming out to lend a hand, you'll need to wear sturdy shoes, a pair of gloves, and dress for the weather. Drinks and snacks will be provided. Public Hearing for New Tree Ordinance

The Talent Planning Commission will be holding a public hearing on May 11, 2000 at 7:30 p.m. to receive public comment on Talent's new tree ordinance. The tree ordinance provides regulations for tree planting and removal in public areas and sets new development requirements for landscaping and tree retention. It's not too late to participate in Census 2000!

A number of residents in communities throughout Southwest Oregon have not yet received their census forms. The good news is, they still have a chance to participate in Census 2000.

The Census Bureau reports that residents who receive mail at Post Office boxes rather than at their homes have probably not received a form yet. The reason is that Census forms can not be delivered to Post Office boxes – they must be delivered to a physical street address. In many communities, this resulted in a considerable number of census forms being returned to the Census Bureau as "Undeliverable as addressed." These households will be visited by census workers who will go door to door to gather the information. The operation is known as "Non-Response Follow Up" and began on April 27. This effort will continue until these households have been reached.

There's a *lawn* at the Downtown Park!

Weed control

Weeds spread fast, so regularly look for new weed patches on your property. Act immediately to treat them by using one of more of the weed control practices listed below. Team up with neighbors to improve effectiveness. Remember, weed control by itself is not enough. It is also necessary to modify the practices that caused weeds to become established in the first place.

Prevention: Good land management will help keep desirable vegetation healthy and weeds under control. Avoid over-grazing (that leaves bare spots for weeds), buy weed-free hay, plant certified seed, wash your vehicle after being in a weed-infested area, monitor your property, and respond quickly to any new weed infestations.

Biological: Biological control attempts to find something in nature that can weaken or eventually kill a weed plant. Successful bioagents include certain fungi and insects that weaken weeds by attacking seed heads and other plant parts.

Mechanical: Mow weeds annually before they go to seed. Pull small weed patches and weeds near streams by hand.

Livestock grazing: Graze weeds before they go to seed using sheep, goats, or cattle. Because livestock and wildlife can easily carry and spread weed seed on their coats or in their feces, avoid moving livestock from a weedy area to a weed-free area. Some weed species, if eaten, will make livestock sick.

Chemical Herbicides: Herbicides can be safe and effective when properly applied. Read label instruction carefully and follow directions. Use chemicals away from water to avoid harming you, your animals or wildlife, and to prevent pollution of streams and

groundwater. Only certified pesticide applicators can use restricted herbicides. Call a local farm supply store to find out about hiring custom chemical applicators to spray your weeds. Be sure herbicides will not reach and kill desirable trees and shrubs. Dispose of leftover chemicals at hazardous waste facilities.
