PLANNING **DEPARTMENT NEWS**

Changes to Fence Regulations

After four months of deliberation before the City Council, the Planning Commission, and Traffic Safety & Transportation Commission, the Council adopted new fence, hedge, wall and screen plantings regulations (Zoning Code, Article 8-3J.3). All new fence and hedge heights will be limited to three feet in the front yard. Existing fences that are four feet tall will be allowed to remain at four feet until 2018.

The arguments that convinced the decision-makers were that three-foot fences are more attractive, create a warmer look for neighborhoods, andabove all—are safer. A shorter fence or hedge offers better sight distance at corners and enhances the ability of police to protect the community.

Beginning in October, all new fences and hedges will be subject to the amended regula-tions. If you have a fence that is four feet high, you have until the end of 2018 to bring it into conformance. Currently illegal hedges and screen plantings have to be made compliant with the new regulations.

Other Code Work

The Council will consider an ordinance to adopt a new zoning district in October that ap-plies to public landsthat is, land under the control or ownership of government or quasi-governmental agencies. Following adoption of the public district, approximately 86 acres will be rezoned. Government buildings, schools, parks, trails, and utilities are the permitted uses in the district. The City has set no date for the rezoning action, but notice will be sent out to nearby property owners prior to the first hearing.

Talent Ave Enhancement Project

TheTalentAvenuestreetimprovement project is moving along on schedule. The storm drain construction on the project has been completed and the contractor has almost finished of Alcohol or Drugs continues to be up the curb, gutter and sidewalks. Constructing new driveway approaches that connect to existing driveways has been complicated and understandably frustrating for some residents along Talent Ave. and we appreciate your patience. The city has met onsite with ODOT and the design engineers and looked at each driveway on a case-bycase basis to come up with the best solution for each driveway. The City of Talent Engineering department has been trying to take care of the residents needs as they come up as best we can.

The engineering department is the best avenue for residents to get concerns looked at during the project. If there are any questions or concerns with the project please give us a call so we can help facilitate the completion of a successful project (535-5531). If the project continues to go smoothly the paving will take place in early October. We appreciate the cooperation of the near by residents during the work and the project will be completed soon.

COP TALK

One of the items I would like to cover this month is how to contact the Talent Police Department when you need police services. Since I have been in town I have received a few messages on my phone telling me about something that was going on over the weekend or the prior evening in town. Unfortunately, there was little we could do regarding the problem the next day.

I would like to give you the best numbers to call when you need police to respond. If you are calling about something that occurred sometime previously or a non-emergency situation call 776-7206. Advise the dispatcher why you're calling and give the address of the incident.

Southern Oregon Regional Communications (SORC) dispatches Talent Police officers. They are open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to take your call and have Talent Police respond.

For emergencies such as a crime in progress or fire or serious medical issues call 911.

I also want to encourage you to call in suspicious circumstances. If you see something that looks wrong then it may quite possibly be wrong. Particularly at night, please call in cars or persons you believe are in places they don't belong.

Officers of Talent Police Department are going to be working overtime on a Grant to enforce laws related to juvenile drinking problems. We will be cooperating with Phoenix Police Department and Jackson County Sheriff's Office in looking for Minors in Possession of Alcohol at "keggers" and private homes. There are serious consequences for minors possessing alcohol beyond the obvious dangers of being harmed while in a vehicle driven by an intoxicated driver or being victimized while intoxicated. Oregon Law provides for sanctions related to driving privileges for minors charged with possession of alcohol.

Additionally, people who provide alcohol to minors face criminal charges.

Alcohol abuse is not just a juvenile problem. Driving Under the Influence a major problem. Don't let impaired drivers drive in this town. Call the police and report them. You may save a life.

HOUSEHOLD WATER SAVING TIPS

Here are a few tips that take little to no effort but will help with our conservation efforts in a big way.

• Never pour water down the drain when there may be another use for it such as watering indoor plants or gardens. Place a bucket in the shower to catch excess water for watering plants.

• Repair dripping faucets by replacing washers. One drop per second wastes

over 2,700 gallons of water in a year.

• Replace showerheads with ultra low-flow versions.

• Avoid flushing the toilet unnecessarily. Dispose of insects or tissue in the trash rather than the toilet.

• Check your toilet to see if it has a leak. Place a drop of dye in the tank of the toilet. Wait ten minutes without flushing; if the dye color comes into the bowl then you have a leak. A leaky toilet can use thousands of gallons of water each month, which converts in to a large water bill.

• Place a plastic bottle filled with water in your toilet tank to reduce the amount of water used per flush.

• Avoid letting the water run when brushing your teeth, washing your face or shaving.

• Operate dishwashers only when they are completely full.

• Store drinking water in the refrigerator. Do not let the tap run while you are waiting for water to cool.

WAYS TO SAVE WATER WHILE LANDSCAPING

• Use mulch to retain soil moisture. Mulch also helps to control weeds that compete with landscape plants for water.

• Avoid sprinklers that spray a fine mist. Mist can evaporate before it reaches the lawn.

• Raise the lawn mower blade to at least three inches or to its highest level. A higher cut encourages grass roots to grow deeper, shades the root system, and holds soil moisture.

• When it is necessary to water, do so in the early morning hours as there is less of a chance for evaporation or loss of water due to wind.

 Only water your lawns and gardens as necessary. IT IS NOT NECESSARY TO WATER YOUR LAWN EVERY DAY. Every other day can sometimes be too often. converting your Consider sprinklei system to an "Evapotranspiration Manager Weather Based Landscape Irrigation System" or "ET Manager System" that regulates the frequency and length of watering time based on the actual needs of your lawn. Talk to your local landscaping company about some great systems that are available at little cost to convert. The savings you will see in your water bill will more than pay for the cost of converting your system
