Winter Weather Is Upon Us: Tips for Water Customers

With winter upon us, now is the time to prepare for the possibility of an extreme winter season and do what we can to avoid costly emergency repairs. Here are some tips that my save you money t his winter:

- Locate your water shut off valve. You should have one located on your property side of the Cities water meter. Make sure you can turn it easily. Don't wait for an emergency to locate this valve.
- Insulate your plumbing (hot water pipes too) in areas that are not heated such as crawl spaces, garages and outside. This will help prevent pipes from freezing.
- Temporarily seal off crawl space holes during winter with foam or cardboard pieces.
- Disconnect garden hoses before freezing temperatures arrive. Place insulated caps on all of your hose bibs.
- Traveling to warmer climates this winter? Before leaving on trips, do not set your thermostats lower than 55°. This will help prevent your pipes from freezing inside your house.

During Freezing Weather

- Maintaining heat in any room that has plumbing fixtures, especially ones with plumbing located on outside walls. Open up cabinet doors under sinks to let the heat in.
- Keep a VERY Small trickle of water (during EXTREME cold times only). This will help prevent pipes from freezing as it is harder for flowing water to freeze. This is most helpful for faucets that are further away from where your water enters the house.
- If your pipes freeze, NEVER try to thaw it with an open flame. Use a hair dryer or space heater to do the job.
- If you are going to be away, ask a friend or neighbor to check your house out during cold spells. If something breaks, they can get it taken care of before it causes much damage.

WINTERIZE YOUR SPRINKLER SYSTEM

This can be one of the most important winter preparations you can do. By doing this simple task you can make your sprinkler system less likely to suffer freezing damage. Sprinkler systems are one of the most common reasons for water leaks during summer months. They are also one of the hardest leaks to detect because often a leak will NOT cause water to rise to the surface.

• Turn off all of your sprinkler sys-

tem controllers. You may also want to disconnect the common wire during the winter to ensure that your system can't accidentally be turned on.

- Shut off the water to your sprinklers. Sometimes there is a valve that isolated the irrigation from the main house water supply. If you do not have one of these valves you may want to consider adding one to your system. Your Backflow Valve System should NOT be used for this purpose. They should be left open to allow for drainage.
- Drain your individual sprinkler components as much as possible. Most newer sprinkler systems are properly equipped to be professionally blown out with air. This is generally at a minimal cost. If yours is not equipped for this, you can briefly remove sprinkler risers or prop them open to help them drain. This is particularly important for systems that are equipped with check valves.
- Installing drains at low points can be very helpful. If you do this, you may want to consider selecting a manual drain instead of an automatic drain. These allow you to control when the system drains rather than it occurring after every irrigation cycle.

One of the great things about Talent is the safety and friendliness of small town living. However, far too often criminals take advantage of our neighborliness and trusting nature. Due to longer hours of darkness and the possibility of more valuables being in the home or left in vehicles, December is a time when unlocked doors on both cars and homes lead to an increase in thefts and burglaries. If you are always locking your doors you will reduce your odds of being victimized.

The holiday shopping season is in full swing despite the current economy. So, here is a list of safety tips as important as your gift list.

Be alert and aware. Be attentive to your surroundings at all times.

Do not carry more cash or valuables than is necessary. Be discreet so that you do not attract attention.

Take extra precautions with your wallet or purse. Carry your purse with the opening flap next to your body and with the strap hung over your shoulder.

Allow for darkness. As I mentioned before, it gets dark early this time of year, so be sure to factor this into shopping plans.

Instruct children on holiday safety measures. Know where your children are at all times. Before going shopping, decide where to meet if you and your children should get separated.

Always lock your car doors and remember take note of where you are parked before you leave your car.

Be sure to put valuables out of sight (i.e. packages, purses, mobile phones, CDs, etc.). Place them in the trunk or take them with you.

Never hide spare keys in or on your car. These hiding places are easily discovered. If you need spare keys, keep them in your wallet or purse.

Be alert to suspicious persons or circumstances. Avoid parking where you see someone sitting in his or her vehicle for no apparent reason. Trust your instincts. If you feel uncomfortable or unsafe in a situation, report it to security immediately.

When walking in any parking lot, grocery store, airport, shopping center, etc., walk confidently with your head up, make eye contact, and have your keys ready.

Drive defensively and courteously. Do not drive across parking stalls. Use appropriate marked driving lanes and obey all traffic signs in the parking lots And remember, parking lots will be more crowded and checkout lanes will be busier, so be patient and have a safe shopping experience.

Report all suspicious activity to the police immediately. We need your help in keeping Talent a safe community. The number for serious in-progress emergencies is 911. For any other police response the number to call is our dispatch center 776-7206.

Another big December problem is drunk driving. Don't let friends, relatives or co-workers or even strangers drive drunk. Report drunk drivers immediately!

Each year Portland State University updates the population estimates for every City in the state based on input from each city's planning office. As of July 1, 2008 the Talent population estimate is 6635. This represents a 19% increase since the US Census was completed in 2000 when the population was 5589.

Disaster Registry – Is it for You?

Disaster Registry is a program designed to identify persons that would need special assistance to evacuate their homes in times of extreme emergency, such as a flood, forest fire, or other disaster.

Is this program for you? You should register, if you or someone you care for, would:

- need outside help to safely leave home during a disaster, or
- be in jeopardy if you stayed in your home, without assistance, for three days, or
- need special notification about the need for evacuation, due to impairment.

How does it work? Citizens enroll themselves into the program by completing a registry form; their information is added to a 911 Emergency Dispatch Center database, and in the event of a disaster making it necessary to evacuate the neighborhood where the citizen lives, emergency services personnel are made aware of the citizen's special needs, and coordinate to provide that assistance.

Does Registry guarantee priority assistance? There are so many needs during a disaster, that emergency re-

sponders can't help everyone at once. But if your name is in the Disaster Registry, they will know of your need for special assistance.

Will my information be kept confidential? Yes, this information is available only to those in Jackson County Emergency Management and the 911 Center, who would pass it directly to emergency responders when needed.

Where to register? The Disaster Registry forms are available at Talent City Hall, and from the Rogue Valley Council of Governments, 155 N. 1st Street, Central Point.
