February is a very unique month. Three of its 28 days are celebrated as special days; Groundhogs Day, Valentines Day and President's Day. So I have three police related tips for you this month.

PARKING VIOLATION

A little known parking violation is parking on the wrong side of the street. You may wonder what parking on the wrong side of the street is. To help understand that here is Section 21 of the Municipal Ordinance.

1)No person shall stand or park a motor vehicle in a street other than parallel with the edge of the roadway, headed in the direction of lawful traffic movement, and with the curbside

wheels of the vehicle within twelve (12) inches of the edge of the curb, except where the street is marked or signed for angle parking.

In essence, you have to park in the direction of traffic on the side of the street where you are parked. The reasoning behind this law is that if you park on the wrong side of the street you have to drive into the oncoming lane while parking and exiting the parking space. This is also a State traffic law.

er, locker or closet. Under your desk or visible to others is not safe.

• Call the police if you notice someone who frequents your business without buying anything or who has no legitimate business there, or who make you feel uncomfortable with their words or actions.

• If you see someone sitting in a vehicle or hanging around outside the business and you think they appear to be suspicious, do not approach them to ask what they are doing. Call the police.

• Walk out to your car with a coworker or friend; or call the police if you need an escort to your vehicle if you feel uneasy about exiting your business.

• If one of your employees has an active restraining or protective order against another person advise the police department and provide them with a copy of the order. Also inform the police if you or your employee has received any threats of violence by that person against the employee or business. The police may be able to provide extra patrol.

• Inform your supervisor if you notice that one of your co-workers seems especially agitated at work or makes comments about violence against the business.

MISSING CHILDREN

Recently the Medford Police Department used a new program to make automatic calls to a defined area surrounding where a missing child was reported. It is a service available to police agencies under defined circumstances.

If your child is missing contact police immediately. Erring on the side of calling for help sooner than later is always OK

Prior to that, always have recent good photographs available for the police to use to help locate your child.

If you think you have seen a missing child: Contact police immediately. Write down full descriptions of the child and anyone with the child as well as vehicle description.

Backflow Prevention Lawn Irrigation Systems

For the protection of the water purveyor's distribution system, all irrigation systems must have an approved backflow prevention assembly that is commensurate with the degree of hazard. Irrigation systems are categorized as high health hazard or moderate health hazard as defined below.

Any irrigation system that contains pumps or injectors for the addition of chemicals and/or fertilizers is considered a high hazard. This risk assessment is also based on the additional hazard posed be bacterial contaminants found on lawns, and on the possibility of changes being made to the irrigation system by the customer. An approved reduced pressure backflow assembly (RPBA), or approved air gap separation, should be required in all cases where chemicals or herbicides may be injected into the irrigation system, or where an auxiliary water supply is also provided for irrigation water.

All irrigation systems that are not classified as high health hazard are considered to be moderate health hazards. This risk assessment is based on the hazard posed by bacterial and chemical contaminants found on lawns, and on the possibility of changes being made to the system by the customer. An approved double check valve assembly (DCVA).

Reduced Pressure Backflow assembly for Isolation of Lawn Irrigation System



The reduced pressure backflow assembly (RPBA) should be installed to isolate irrigation systems using injectors or pumps to apply fertilizer and other agricultural chemicals.

The RPBA must be installed above ground to prevent the relief valve from opening and from becoming submerged.

The RPBA should be installed in an insulated enclosure to provide freeze protection.

The RPBA should be tested by a certified backflow assembly tester upon installation, after any repair or relocation, and at least annually.

Double Check Valve Assembly for Isolation of Lawn Irrigation System

The double check valve assembly (DCVA) may be installed to isolate all irrigation systems that do not use injectors or pumps to apply fertilizer and other agricultural chemicals.

The DCVA may be installed in a below ground enclosure. The assembly test cocks must be plugged pointed up.

Adequate space must also be provided for maintenance and testing, and any compressed air connections must only be installed downstream of the DCVA.

The DCVA shall be tested by a certified backflow assembly tester upon installation, after any repair or relocation, and at least annually.

What is legal basis for a local cross connection control program?

The federal Safe Drinking Water Act. The Oregon Health Division regulates public water systems in our state, including cross connection control, through Oregon Administrative Rules (OARs).

One such rule is OAR 333-61-0070, which requires water districts to administer a cross connection control program that will protect the potable water supply, and City of Talent Ordinance 649 on cross connection control. For more information, visit www. cityoftalent.org

RECYCLING TELEPHONE BOOKS

What to do with the old telephone books when the new ones come out in April? Talent residents have two opportunities to recycle their old telephone books once the new directories are delivered in mid April. For all residents, but especially those Talent residents outside the city limits, you can take the phone books to Talent Elementary School for their phone book collection drive as part of the Oregon Green Schools Program, which Talent Elementary is a proud member. The school will accept phone books from residents or businesses that are dropped off to the school. For questions contact Denise Wright at Talent Elementary 535-1531. Ashland Sanitary will provide a pick up service at the school for all phone books accumulated. As another option, residents in city limits receiving recycling service can place those used phone books with your other recyclables or take them to the Ashland transfer station anytime throughout the year. New hours at the transfer station are Tues-Sat. 9:00am-5:00pm, closed Sun. and Mon.
