## Urban Renewal News

**Construction Begins on West Valley View Project:** A simple groundbreaking ceremony the morning of Wednesday, May 18, marked the start of construction for "Phase 1-A" for this long-awaited project. After 7 years of planning, the first segment of this project - construction of Seiber Street with over 30 head-in parking spaces, a storm detention pond, New Street improvements, and an alley north of

the new Camelot Theatre - is now under way. While the contractor is allowed until November 30 to finish this phase, it is possible the majority of work could be completed by the end of summer. Many thanks to the 40 or so citizens who attended the groundbreaking -- which was announced at the last minute following an unanticipated change in the contractor's schedule allowing work to begin four weeks ahead of schedule!

**Board of Directors Position:** The Agency has one opening for a citizen/business representative on its 7 member Board of Directors. The term is for three years, and runs from July 2011 through June 2014. Responsibilities include going through an initial 2-hour board training, and attending monthly board meetings (third Tuesdays). Applicants will interview with the Board of Directors, and the Board in turn sends its recommendation to the City Council for final appointment. ## The Chief's Report: Firelines

### Budget Planning FY 2011-2012

During the last several months, the Jackson County Fire District # 5 Budget Committee has been meeting to review and approve the proposed budget for FY 2011-2012. The Budget Committee is comprised of the 5 Board of Directors (elected officials) and 5 community members appointed by the Board.

At the April meeting the Budget Committee approved a FY 2011-2012 tax levy totaling \$ 4,222,117 which includes funds for personnel (27 career firefighters, 12 student firefighters, 35 volunteer firefighters), materials and services to support 3 stations and related costs, capital outlay expenditures for fire equipment, mobile data computers and monies for an 80/20 grant for a new station alerting system at each fire station. The budget also includes funding of existing debt service totaling \$ 294,604 and provides for a contingency fund for unforeseen expenditures of \$238,455 or 5.6% of the total levy.

The fire district will hold the Budget Hearing on June 21, 2011, 7:00 pm, at Station 1, 5811 South Pacific Highway to formally adopt the budget and appropriate, impose and categorize taxes.

### Personnel Update

During the last 18 months there have been several retirements, promotions and replacement of long term employees at the fire district. In January 2010, Fire Captain Frank Banfield (32 years) and Fire Captain Richard Scowden (31 years) retired. Also, In February 2011, Fire Captain Alan Barnes (23 years) and Firefighter Eric Campbell (26 years) retired.

Promotions to position of Fire Captain include Brian Bolstad, Tony Halley and Bryan Dorris. Promotions to the position of Fire Engineer include Matt Lichtenstein, Nick Baalman and Dave Meads. Also, newly appointed firefighters during the past year are Firefighter Brian Weidman, Firefighter Brady Graham, Firefighter Clayton Mattson and Firefighter Winston Cote.

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### Apparatus and Equipment

During the past year, the fire district purchased two 2011 Ford F-450 grass and brush vehicles to replace outdated units. Grass and brush vehicles are used for fighting wildland fires. The Ford F-450 is a four wheel-drive utility type vehicle that is highly maneuverable and capable of carrying a water tank (150-200 gallons), pump and hose.

Also this past year the fire district received a grant from The Chaney Foundation and received monies from a fundraising event sponsored by Blackstone Audio, Ashland, Oregon, which allowed for the purchase of two Thermal Imaging Cameras. A Thermal Imaging Camera is a vital piece of equipment for firefighting operations, community protection and life safety. Thermal Imaging Cameras enable firefighters to see areas of heat, through smoke, darkness or heat-permeable barriers. They also allow firefighters to quickly find the fire and see the heat signature of visually obscured victims. The total cost of the two cameras was approximately \$17,500.

Remember, at Fire District # 5 we are very proud of our motto, "We still make house calls."

## Arbor Day Foundation Names Talent a Tree City USA® Community

Talent, OR, was recently recognized by the nonprofit Arbor Day Foundation as a Tree City USA community for its commitment to urban forestry.

Talent has earned this national designation for 11 years.

The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation in cooperation with the National Association of State Foresters and the USDA Forest Service.

Talent has met the four standards to become a Tree City USA community. Tree City USA communities must have a tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, a comprehensive community forestry program, and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

"We commend Talent's elected officials, volunteers and its citizens for providing vital care for its urban forest," said John Rosenow, chief

executive and founder of the Arbor Day Foundation. "Trees provide numerous environmental, economical and health benefits to millions of people each day, and we applaud communities that make planting and caring for trees a top priority."

Communities that earn Tree City USA recognition not only have taken the time to meet the four standards, they know that trees:

- Promote healthier communities by filtering the air we breathe by removing dust and other particles.
- Moderate climate, conserve water and provide vital habitat for wildlife.
- Reduce the heat island effect in urban areas caused by pavement and buildings.
- Increase property values and reduce energy use and add beauty to our homes and neighborhoods.

### Talent PD News

#### Cell Phone Use

I have been asked by the members of our Talent Traffic Safety & Transportation Commission to remind drivers not to use cell phones while driving without using a hands free device. It is misinformation that you may use a cell phone if you are "on business." That exemption applies to a very limited number of drivers. The best example is a cab driver and I really can't think of any other. The law is being strengthened but for now we will be enforcing it as is and a citation costs \$142.

#### Reserve Program

One of the programs TPD sponsors is a reserve program. Reserves today must go through a 9 month course on their own time and without compensation. It is hosted by Rogue Community College. Of the students who graduated in late May, three were sponsored by Talent PD. As part of the training, students were required to develop a community project. Talent's reserves were recognized for their community project, receiving special recognition certificates.

Out of 19 graduates, Talent PD's Steven Barrett was the top student in the class. Our other two graduates, Aaron Armen and Robert Lebel, also had high scores. The three will now complete the reserve application process prior to joining TPD later this summer. A fourth Talent sponsored student was Jason Curtright who we have been told is in a hiring process with Central Point PD.

#### Beware of Scam

One of the latest scams goes like this: a check is mailed to you with instructions to cash it, and then write a check back to the sender. BEWARE - any check received under these circumstances is fraudulent. Here are some tips on spotting fake checks received via mail or in hard copy.

- Examine the check carefully before depositing: Look for anything out of the ordinary. Most fakes are extremely difficult to detect, even by banks. They may use names of legitimate banks and have an account number, but they are still fake.
- Physical aspects of the check: the paper on fake checks is often lighter and may have a slick texture. Most legitimate checks have at least one perforated or rough edge. If all edges are smooth, the check may have been printed from a personal computer.
- Printed information: A fake

check often has no bank logo or one that's faded-this may indicate it was copied from an online photo. There may be no street address, just a P.O. box or an incorrect ZIP code, or sometimes the name is misspelled-all indicate a fake check. If there's no check number at the upper right-hand corner, or the number doesn't match the check number in the computerized line of numbers along the bottom of the check, you've got a counterfeit.

If your banker tells you a check is fraudulent or that your actions may be unsafe, believe them. Many people have ignored professional advice and lost a great deal of money.

#### Disposal for Prescription Drugs

Several months ago the Talent Police Department and City Manger Jay Henry began researching cost-effective and ecologically friendly disposal methods for prescription drugs. Partnering with Recology Ashland Sanitary Service, the City of Talent now offers an easy method of disposal for outdated or surplus medications.

There is a drop box at Talent PD. The box was designed, constructed and installed by staff at Recology. Drop off times are Monday through Friday, 8am to noon and 1pm to 4pm, in the lobby, at the Talent Police Department.

**IMPORTANT:** the program accepts: OTC & prescription medications, pet meds, medicated ointment/lotions, and liquid in leak-proof containers. Not accepted: needles (sharps), thermometers, bloody/infectious waste, hydrogen peroxide, aerosol cans/inhalers, food items/supplements/vitamins, meds from businesses or clinics.

When dropping off pills, please remove them from their original containers and place contents in a zip lock bag for the drop box. We encourage you to recycle the original containers, along with your other home recycling (first remove the caps, they are not recyclable). We also suggest that you block out your name on all original containers.

Proper disposal of these drugs will help keep our streams and rivers cleaner and safer.

### Chief Moran Joins National Effort To Combat Crimes Of Violence Against Women

Talent Police Chief Mike Moran was chosen as one of 24 law enforcement executives from across the country to participate in the 14<sup>th</sup> *National Law Enforcement Leadership Institute on Violence Against Women* hosted by The International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP).

During the four-day Institute held in Kansas City, MO, Chief Moran, along with the other selected participants from agencies around the United States, explored innovative approaches for investigating crimes of domestic violence, sexual assault, human trafficking and stalking. Attendees also focused on assessing agency performance and sharing challenges and solutions with law enforcement colleagues.

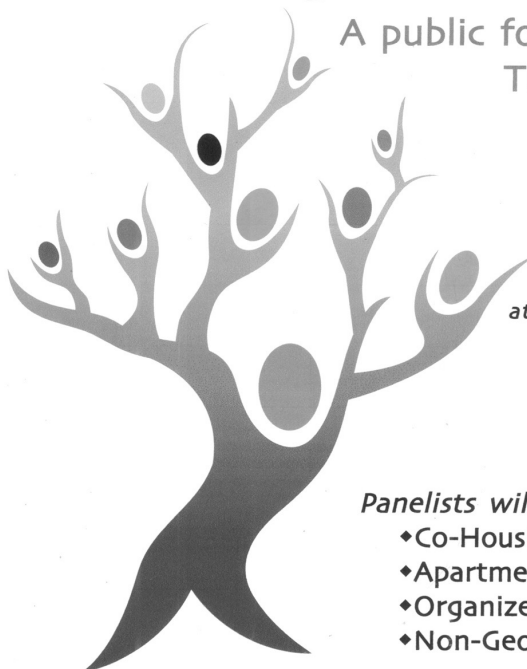
