From the Mayor's Office

A lot has happened at City Hall in the past month. On June 1^{st} , the City Council voted to not renew the City Manager's employment contract for the fiscal year



beginning July 1, 2011. At the time I am writing this article, the City Council is in the process of selecting an interim City Manager. Hopefully by the time you read this article this will have happened. The next step is to begin recruitment for a full time City Manager. It is anticipated this will take from four to six months. I can assure you this will be an open process involving citizens of Talent.

I know a number of Talentians are concerned that major problems propelled the change at City Hall. I do not feel comfortable speaking for City Council on this subject. If you have concerns, I suggest you contact your City Councilors directly. I am confident, however, that the day to day operations at City Hall are functioning as efficiently as ever. We have an extremely competent staff who work together effectively to carry out City business with limited resources. I believe you can be very proud of your City. Talent is one of the few cities that is not having to make major changes to balance the budget. In fact, our City was able to dedicate \$8,000 to initiate a new program to promote public art. The City Council also dedicated \$2,000 for the Mayor to promote economic development.

I am so proud to serve the citizens of Talent and our City Staff. Those of us serving the City may not see eye to eye on every issue, but we collaborate and get things done. It is very important, however, that we recruit an interim and then a full time City Manager as soon as possible. A ship, no matter how good the crew, will start to drift without someone at the helm.

PUBLIC WORKS

Please help control puncture vine.

With current soil moisture and sunny days, this noxious weed is growing rampantly. Talent Public Works is making a concerted effort to control puncture vine on city property and public rights-of-way and is asking that you please check your property and take steps to stop its spread.

The vine is a low, mounding annual plant that spreads as much as ten feet in diameter from a central base. Flowers are yellow with five petals, and leaves are composed of 4 to 8 pairs of leaflets. It survives in conditions unfavorable to most other plants, including drought. It prefers dry, sandy or gravely sites.

The best method of control is to destroy the first plants found in an area before burs begin to form. If green burs carrying seed are present - pull, bag and burn the plants, including loose seed pods. Check with Jackson County Fire District 5 for burn permits and fire restrictions.

Chemical control must be well-planned as the plants begin producing viable seeds within 4 weeks and spraying a mature plant will only increase the infestation when the seed heads drop to the ground and are spread. Contract the Oregon State

University Extension Service for more information.

Thanks for doing your part to control this weed.

Construction of Seiber Street: As of this writing, construction crews have laid underground utilities and storm drains, and are preparing to pour curbs and light bases. Sidewalks and paving are anticipated to occur around mid-July. Seiber Street is a brand new street designed to provide headin parking and a connection between New Street near Umpqua Bank and the future extension of Main Street behind the new Camelot Theatre. A storm detention pond near New Street is in the process of being built, and will eventually look like a fenced, grassy swale.

Malmgren Garage Project Completed: Property owner Bonnie Morgan recently completed an Agency-funded façade improvement project at the historic 1925 Malmgren Garage building at 111 Talent Avenue. The former site of Southern Oregon Pottery Supply, it now houses professional sculptors. The Agency funded this project through its Rehab/Façade Improvement grant program. Improvements consist of new wooden bi-fold doors to replicate originals seen in early photographs, window and glass repair, drainage correction, and paint.

News from the Parks Commission & Together for Talent Committee July 16 Workparty - Wagner Creek Trail Let's hear it for volunteers! Thanks

to the great generosity of Mike Davis of SOS Plumbing and the efforts of Together for Talent, Talent Parks planning Commission, director Mark Knox and many enthusiastic volunteers, the Old Bridge walkway along Wagner Creek is being extended by a trail through the SOS Plumbing property. This zero budget, all volunteer project will provide much needed walking access from Talent Avenue to Highway 99 at Wagner Creek. Talent PD News By Chief Mike Moran

Last July in my article I wrote: "This Spring was one of the wettest and coldest in recent years." Spring 2011 seemed a lot worse.

One thing a damp and cold Spring does is to delay the declaration of fire season by the Oregon Department of Forestry. That declaration is the point after which we begin enforcement of the weed abatement ordinance per the Municipal code of Talent.

Meanwhile we have been taking calls about high weeds and have begun tracking them. By the time this article is out we should be in the fire season and will begin enforcement mode.

Thankfully, most property owners have great pride in ownership and keep weeds mowed for aesthetic reasons. However, weeds are a danger. Last summer shortly after the Ashland Oak Knoll Fire we had a fire in the field north of Oak Valley in Talent. Fire District 5 did a great job keeping that threat under control. But this serves to prove high weeds are a serious issue.

Please mow your grass and weeds to less than ten inches to be in compliance with our city ordinance.

We have a new volunteer weed compliance coordinator this summer. Her name is Divya Amesur. She is a student at SOU. Divya is the third summer volunteer TPD has used. In 2009 we utilized London Westerfield, a Talent student attending Oregon State. Last summer Ben Weaver, a Criminology student at SOU, did a great job for us. We are glad to have Divya with us.

I'd also like to mention another volunteer, Marlene Fazio of Talent. Marlene is doing great work for us in our records and evidence tracking.

Soon you will see three new Talent Police Reserves. All three of our new reserves graduated very highly in the reserve academy which concluded in May. We will have more on them later.

One item I am often asked about is yard sale signs. Talent City Ordinance prohibits posting them. They are a distraction when posted on public sign poles, particularly at busy intersections. Although we usually do not cite for first time offenders, a citation can be issued. Another problem is that most people leave their signs posted after the event and it looks trashy. Please don't post signs on public poles, on roadsides or on other's property. A sign in your own yard on the date of the event is fine.

Scams continue to be at minimum a nuisance to Talent residents. They can also be a serious financial problem. The latest scam is someone from the 876 Area Code calls and offers a million dollars if you will wire \$50 of you money to a California address. Sound too good to be true? It is!

The 876 number is a Jamaican area code. Do not call this number as additional fees could be placed on your phone bill. The best course of action is to hang-up immediately on these criminals. You may receive numerous calls but hang up and never offer any information to them.
