From the Mayor's Office

There have been a number of positive things that have happened in Talent in the month of July. The first is that Talent City Council appointed Dale Shaddox as City Manager pro tem until the position can be filled on a



more permanent basis. It is expected this will take about six months. Dale is a resident of the Rogue Valley and has many years of experience both as an interim and full time City Manager. If you have not already met Dale, stop by City hall and welcome him to Talent.

The second thing I would like to report is that the Rogue Valley Area Commission on Transportation (RVACT) unanimously voted to reprogram funds to make the Highway 99 modernization project from Rapp Road to Creel Road possible. This will still need to be approved by the Oregon Transportation Commission but RVACT's vote is a huge step in the process. The Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) went over the top in developing a funding package that made this all possible. I want to personally thank Art Anderson and the whole ODOT crew for their support. We can expect design on this project to start in 2012 and construction in

Thirdly, I would like to thank the 30+ volunteers who showed up on July 16th to put the finishing touches on the trail along Wagner Creek from Old Bridge Village to Highway 99. I must also thank SOS Plumbing for allowing this trail to be constructed over their land and for using their equipment to do the grading. Wood chips for the trail were donated by Upper Limb-It Tree Service. This was a true Community project and the reason I am so proud to live in Talent.

West Valley View First Phase Nearly Complete: The first phase of construction to install Seiber Street, an alley near the new theater, a storm detention pond, and sidewalks on New Street is nearing completion. Paving has already occurred, planter beds will soon be filled with soil, and striping and signage should all be done by the end of July. In August, the general contractor Pilot Rock Excavation will return to complete final small tasks, including creating a fenced turnaround at the south end of Seiber Street to allow all parking spaces to be fully utilized. The turnaround will remain in place until next summer, when Main Street can be extended and a safe intersection at Talent and Main can be created. The project team is considering purchasing a decorative type of barrier block to keep cars out of undeveloped areas, while still allowing easy passage for pedestrians and bicycles. These blocks can be moved to different locations within the West Valley View project, and could be donated to the City if no longer needed by the Agency. The Agency is also discussing additional work with the general contractor which would connect the Seiber Street sidewalk with the sidewalk in front of Camelot and provide some leveling of the Main Street extension area for an improved appearance. The extent of the work and timing depends on the relocation schedule of old Camelot Theater (see below). For now, the Seiber Street will be illuminated by a few tall cobra heads lights at the intersections. These lights use an LED light source as part of a Pacific Power pilot project - the first to be installed in southern Oregon. Pedestrian scale lighting and landscaping will occur next summer, as it will be more cost effective to have that work performed after the Main Street extension has been accomplished.

Old Camelot Theatre to be Relocated: A contract has been signed with Chris LaDue to acquire the old theater building and move it to his property on Wagner Creek Road. A large article on this project was featured recently in the Mail Tribune. The relocation will begin as soon as permits are received and will take several weeks, during which time the building will be cut into three pieces and moved piece by piece down Main Street to Wagner Creek Road. It is hoped the relocation schedule can be posted on the old "blackboard" sign next to the old theater so the public can be kept informed of the relocation schedule and watch the process as it unfolds.

Talent PD News

This month I have been Chief of Talent PD for 3 years. I deeply enjoy working in this great community and I appreciate your support for this excellent group of police officers and our support staff.

One of the things we receive a great deal of comments on is traffic enforcement. No one likes to receive a ticket but issuing citations for traffic offenses is an integral part of making our city safe.

Some things you may not know are that the fine amount you see on your citation is established by the Oregon Legislature. They also have established rules about how much the judge can reduce a citation.

Some comments I receive are "why can't you give warnings?" We can and sometimes do depending on the violation. It is up to the officer's discretion. However, if warnings are always given, soon there will be no accountability for driving because everyone will know they will only receive a warning.

Another comment is "why are the bails so high?" As I mentioned, the Legislature establishes them. But here is some good news, in this past session they have actually lowered the traffic fines and given judges more leeway in reducing fines. Among items in the bill, the new law: establishes the presumptive fine by statute, applies this fine statewide, and eliminates variability in fine amounts based on the court into which a person is cited;

Provides for judicial discretion to reduce the presumptive fine by up to 50 percent;

Increases the judicial discretion in school, construction, and safety corridor zones fine to 75 percent of the presumptive fine; and the new bail schedule drops Class A violations from \$472 to \$435; Class B from \$287 to \$260; Class \$190 to \$160 and Class D from \$142 to \$110.

We have our radar trailer working again, thanks to the efforts of Officer Schweizer. If we receive a request from citizens, we will put the trailer out in your neighborhood. Contact Officer Gail Schweizer at TPD 541.535-1253 ext. 1009.

This summer we have had a series of unauthorized entry to motor vehicle cases.

There have been a couple of groups that picked Talent as a random stop in their criminal tour of the valley breaking into cars in Medford, Central Point and here. Our officers worked closely with MPD and recovered a great deal of property from one of the episodes.

However, most of the thefts could have been prevented by locking doors on vehicles and secondly by not leaving valuables in vehicles.

Recently there was a vehicle stolen in another city in the valley. The victim had been out drinking at a restaurant, left her vehicle in the parking lot and went home with a friend. When she was asked why she had left her vehicle unlocked and keys on the front console, her response was "come on, this is(fill in your city)."

I hear that a lot about crime in Talent. Sadly, there are people who will steal if given the opportunity. That brings up a criminology theory that is quite accurate: A criminal must have three elements present before committing a crime:

- 1. Desire to commit the crime
- 2. Skills and ability to commit it 3. Opportunity

We don't have much control over the criminal's desire, skill and ability. But we can take away the criminal's opportunity to succeed.

Make your cars and homes difficult for criminals by locking them up to start. Then take steps to hide and secure items of value. Remove the opportunity.

Prescription Drugs Deposit Box

To help keep prescription medicines away from children and out of our landfill, water supply and waste water treatment systems Recology Ashland Sanitary Service is pleased to partner with the Ashland Police Department and the Talent Police Department to provide a container to deposit unwanted prescription drugs.

The local deposit box is located in the lobby of the Talent Police Department, 604 Talent Avenue. You can drop off your unwanted prescriptions Monday–Friday, 8am–noon & 1pm–4pm.

What is <u>ACCEPTABLE</u> to leave in the deposit box:

Prescriptions

Over the counter medications

Medication samples

Medication samples
Medications for pets

Ointments

Lotions

Liquid medication in glass or leak proof containers

What is <u>NOT ACCEPTABLE</u> to leave in the deposit box:

Needles (sharps)

Thermometers

Bloody or infectious waste

Medications from businesses or clinics

Hydrogen peroxide

Aerosol cans or inhalers

Food items

Supplements

*Please leave the prescription in its container so it can be easily identified. For privacy purposes personal information such as name and address can be blacked out.
