## From the Mayor's Office

Is Talent destined to become a bedroom community? -- I hope not. Except for the most affluent cities, bedroom communities always struggle with budget and identity issues. The real contributions business makes to



a city is not in tax base, but in livability. A good example is Ron Ridgway and Tarks Market. Along with providing groceries, Ron contributes both time and resources to just about everything that goes on in Talent. Another good example is Candace Selden at South Valley Bank. For the last two years, South Valley Bank has provided scholarships to less fortunate kids to participate in our summer recreation program. Or how about Denise at Talent Café. Denise, along with a number of volunteers, will be providing a free meal at the Talent Café on March 7th. These are just a few examples of businesses who provide heart and soul to our community. There are so many others. I am a firm believer that a strong business community is a must for a successful city. So what is the City doing right now to encourage business to locate in Talent?

The Valley View project, when completed in a couple of years, should make Talent more attractive for retail business in the downtown core. My hope is to develop some form of incentives to encourage new construction and new business in this area.

The 99 corridor will attract businesses that benefit from highway exposure. The City is currently working on three projects that will make this area more attractive to business. First, the City has been successful in partnering with the Oregon Department of Transportation to upgrade that portion of the 99 corridor from Rapp Road to Creel Road. Secondly, the Planning Commission is currently working on a master plan for this area. Third, we are encouraging landowners adjacent to 99, who are not in the City, to annex to the City. I believe it is important for the 99 corridor to develop under one set of standards and not a mixture of County and City.

Everyone in Talent, including me, is concerned with Wal-Mart closing. I can tell you that we are in contact with Wal-Mart and have a good working relationship. We have also been in contact with Southern Oregon Regional Economic Development (SORED), several state agencies, and private consultants to discuss potential uses for the site. This is an ongoing process. Our policy is to assist Wal-Mart in any way we can to find a tenant for the property that benefits both Wal-Mart and the City of Talent.

For Talent businesses to thrive requires our support. When in the market for a product or service, think Talent first.

Avista Utility work in the City of Talent

Avista Utilities will begin working in the City of Talent on February 22nd, 2012 and will continue to work within the City until approximately October 2012. Avista is replacing certain pipes within the City that are nearing the end of their respective service life. Most of the projects that are scheduled are small projects scattered throughout most parts of town. I would expect that most citizens will see some work in the vicinity of their residence sometime this summer. Avista has been coordinating with the City very well while ramping up for this effort. The City and/or Avista do not have an exact time that they will be at each location. Avista is notifying neighbors in the direct vicinity prior to starting work at each location. The work is being scheduled so that Avista's contractor will start and finish each project prior to moving on to the next project to limit the length of disturbance at each construction location. The maximum number of crews that Avista will have working in the City at any given time is two crews. Spring will be here officially this month and hopefully so will spring weather. With that comes an increase in the number of pedestrians and bicycles using our streets and the bike-path. Please slow down not only around schools but also in all residential areas. We receive complaints about speeding drivers in many neighborhoods and we often find the speeders are the residents of that very area.

Another serious traffic issue is the threat of distracted drivers. Distracted drivers are drivers who forget they are piloting a several thousand pound device that can cause injury and death. I have seen distracted drivers putting on make-up, turning around and yelling at people in the rear seat, and even reading a book while driving. But the most prevalent distracted drivers are those illegally using a cell phone while driving. Most of the loopholes for doing so are now removed from the law. Basically, you need to use a hands free cell phone unit while driving and talking on your cell phone. I have received several requests to strongly enforce the cell phone law. Innocent people are being killed and injured by distracted drivers who put their convenience ahead of the safety of others. I have instructed my department to strictly enforce the law. We have put out several educational pieces on this law. Warnings have not been effective in reducing the number of violators at all. If you are stopped for driving while using a cell phone illegally expect to be given a citation.

While we are on the topic of cell phones, one of the many benefits of having a cell phone is it can quickly summon emergency aid. What many don't know is if a cell phone has power it can still call 911 even if the phone is not on an activated calling plan. This results in extra work for emergency dispatchers and police when the phone is given to a child as a toy. We had a serious report made from a child on a cell phone that did not have an active account but it did have a battery in it. The child made a false emergency phone call and did it again an hour later. With the help of our Dispatch center we were able to locate the child and take the phone away. Please don't

give old cell phones to kids to play with unless it has no battery or other power source.

If you ever do need police assistance, the number to call is 911 for emergency immediate response calls. For other police response to non-emergency situations call 541-776-7206 and you will get to our dispatch center that will send the appropriate agency.

**West Valley View:** Despite being quiet for the last few months via the FLASH, Talent Urban Renewal Agency has been working behind the scenes closing out last summer's construction of Seiber Street behind the new Camelot Theatre building, working with the owner of the old theater building for its move up to its new home on Wagner Creek Road, and planning to bid the next phases of West Valley View construction. At present, the Agency is considering a re-financing of its outstanding urban renewal bonds in order to save interest costs as it readies itself to sunset sometime in 2016. This will also help the Agency plan construction phasing for the next three years. The current plan is to go to bid soon for Summer 2012 and 2013 construction, which will extend Main Street in 2012 and complete the roundabout in 2013.

**Rehab Grants:** Keep an eye out for a new awning being installed soon at Middleway Medicine and Talent Clinic. This awning is funded through the Agency's Façade Improvement/Grant program.
