HOLIDAY STATISTICS

The upcoming Memorial Weekend will find friends and relatives honoring the memory of 11 former motorists who died in Memorial Weekend crashes last year, according to Police Chief Roberts.

"The irony in these statistics is doubly tragic," he said, "because these deaths were preventable. Excessive speed, drinking drivers and fatigue were the specific causes attributed to those accidents."

Officials have been warning motorists for years about the hazards of mixing drinking and driving. "But," the chief said, "drivers go on killing themselves and others by getting behind the wheel after drinking." Drivers who don't drink should not consider themselves safe from this hazard, he warned, but should be on the lookout constantly for drivers that do drink and then drive.

"The other two holiday traffic killers, excessive speed and fatigue, are often brought on by one common human failing--poor planning," he continued.

Families that plan a trip over the coming weekend should allow plenty of time for travel so that it won't be necessary to drive at excessive speeds, he advised. "Also plan time for rest stops and leave for home early enough that you won't have to drive when tired and groggy."

"On Memorial Weekend, honor the dead," Chief Roberts cautioned, "don't join them."

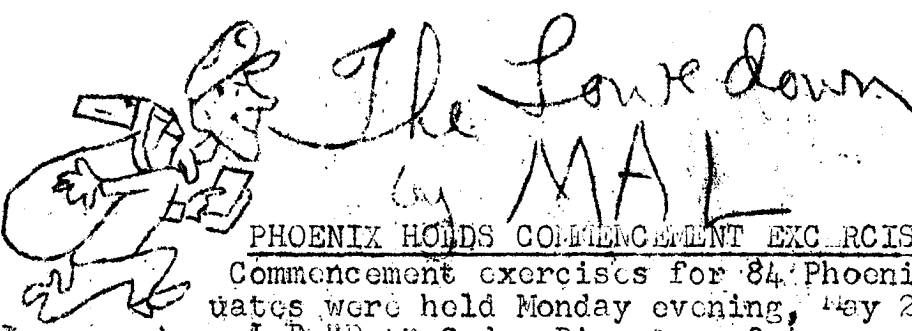

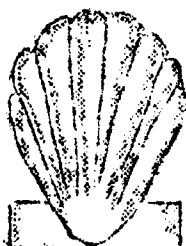

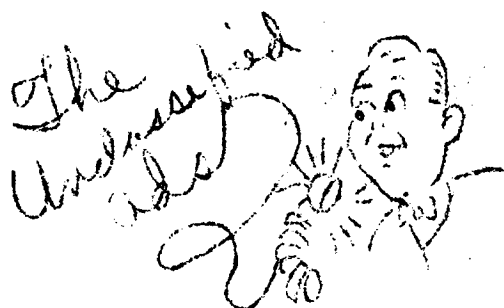
