**TALENT SENATOR SELECTED FOR  
EDUCATION AWARD**

Lynn W. Newbry, state senator from Talent, has been selected the Oregon Education Citizen of the Year. Newbry was selected for his "significant contributions to the cause of public education on both the local and state levels."

Each year the OEA honors a lay citizen who has performed outstanding service to public education in the state over a period of time.

Newbry was honored during the annual OEA Awards Dinner last Tuesday night at the Hilton Hotel.

Newbry was selected Education Citizen of the Year by a committee made up of various segments of OEA.

The award cites Newbry for his service on the Talent School Board and the Phoenix School Board, Newbry was instrumental in the consolidation of the two districts, according to the award citation.

Newbry currently is active in a continuing study of community colleges and the apprenticeship training programs.

The award says, "Senator Newbry is a leader in the advancement of the state's teaching profession. His interest and help enabled the teaching profession of Oregon to meet as equals with school boards in discussions of professional economic matters."

"He was instrumental in establishment of the State Teacher Standards and Practices Commission, through which the profession will police its own ranks."

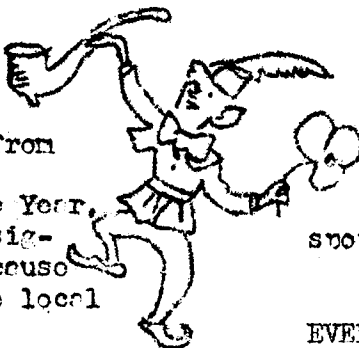

March 14, 1967

The Talent City Council held their regular meeting on the above date. Present: Mayor Brittsan, Councilmen Lois Yockel, Lucky Gilbreath, Dave Baylon, John Tompkins, and Ellis Beeson. Absent: George Gleim. Also present was City Recorder Grace Millage and Attorney Dames.

Motion was made by Gilbreath, seconded by Beeson, that bills be paid as presented. Minutes from previous meeting were read and approved as read.

Gilbreath made a motion, seconded by Beeson, that the City donate a sixty foot right-of-way through the north end of City property, on the water plant property, to the County, and in exchange for the use of this right-of-way, Mr. & Mrs. Antonio Beebe will give the City a deed for some property 100x150 feet (150 feet east and west, 100 feet north and south) City to use this property for a new reservoir. This motion was carried unanimously. Mr. & Mrs. Beebe also wanted the right to purchase City water. Attorney Dames was instructed to draw up the necessary papers pertaining to this exchange of property.

Mr. Bill Beeson was also present, and stated that he will donate to the County another forty feet to the twenty foot easement the City has, making a sixty foot road, and he also would like to be able to purchase City water. No action taken on his request.

Insurance bids covering vehicles and miscellaneous items for the City were again discussed. Insurance men from different companies were present, and answered questions regarding these bids. It was decided by Council that the acceptance of a bid would be tabled for the present time. In the meantime, Mrs. Yockel and Dave Baylon were appointed by Mayor to look into the insurance policies the City has at the present time, so that bids may be called for at a later date, covering all the needs of the City regarding insurance.

A public hearing was held on the issuing of a "use variance" on the Dymock property (D & D Pre-cut Lbr). Mr. Dymock spoke briefly, and stated that the burning of waste material was kept at a minimum. Fire Chief Ralph Conner stated the State Fire Marshall's report was very favorable. Gilbreath made motion, seconded by Beeson, that the City allow the "use variance." Carried unanimously.

Ordinances #203 and 204 were read by Attorney Dames by title only. Both Ordinances were accepted by City unanimously.

Ordinance #205 was read in full by Attorney Dames. Next reading will be by title only. This Ordinance is setting a date for a public hearing on the withdrawal of certain annexed real property from the Talent Rural Fire Protection District, and directing Recorder to post notices as required by law. This is pertaining to the Coudrey-Hartley property, and the public hearing is set for April 11, 1967, at 8:00 p.m. in the City Hall. This Ordinance was accepted by Council.

Two gasoline bids were opened, and motion was made and seconded that the lowest bid be accepted, which was from Phillips Petroleum. The price: .2365 for regular, and .2615 for premium.

Beeson made a motion, seconded by Gilbreath, that the pump, which has been in one of the wells for some time, be re-wound and placed up at the water plant. Carried unanimously.

Sam Oetinger, representing the Planning Commission, gave an invitation to Council to attend their next meeting, which will be held on March 20th, at City Hall, at which time they will have a guest speaker from the Medford Planning Commission. Gilbreath gave a brief report on the subject of remodeling of the fire hall. He stated that he had not contacted Mr. Jacobs, but that he would contact

him in the very near future and see what has been accomplished in regards to figuring out an estimate on the remodeling of this building.

Mayor Brittsen told the Council that the Budget Committee had finished their work in preparing the Budget for the 1967-68 fiscal year, and setting the date of March 21st, at 8:00 p.m. in the City hall, for the formal presentation to the Council of the Budget.

Tompkins spoke briefly on the need of the City having a Fire Prevention Code book, and Recorder was asked to write a letter to the League of Oregon Cities requesting copies of this Code book.

Commissioner Keating and Mr. Robert J. Carstensen, County Engineer, were present. Commissioner Keating read a resolution by the County Court in the matter of improvement of County roads within incorporated cities of Jackson County. He spoke briefly on item #3, of the Resolution, pertaining to the limit of funds made available by the County, that it shall not exceed \$60,000 in any one budget year for County road expenditures within city limits, and that said limit shall be subject to review by the County Court periodically and may be revised upward or downward. Commissioner Keating also stated that the County would assume all the asphalt paving, and the cost to the City would be drainage, curbs and gutters; also the City would have to agree to assume jurisdiction of road and street after completion, and relieve County of any future participation.

Mr. Carstensen spoke briefly about bandcrofting; that the City, County and property owners would all share one-third in the completion of these streets. Mr. Carstensen stated that everything had to be let out on a contract. That 51% of property owners had to get a petition for bandcrofting; engineer will give an estimate. The people will then be notified about the assessments. If bandcrofting did not go through, then the City will have to stand the cost of engineering, etc. Mayor asked Mr. Carstensen to contact State and see if Valley View Street, within the City, will be eligible for State aid. Mr. Carstensen also stated that the City would be obligated to assume all responsibility for putting in the inter-sections.

Commissioner Keating also spoke briefly about the County entering into an agreement with Oak Street Tank and Steel, Ashland, about disposing of all old cars that have been abandoned, within the Valley. He will contact different men to get these cars to the Oak Street Tank and Steel Company.

Meeting adjourned.

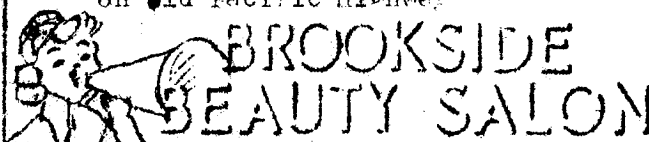
