Nearly one hundred guests attended the wedding and reception held in the church annex.

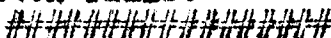

July 11, 1967

The Council of the City of Talent met in regular session at 8:00 p.m. on July 11th. Present: Mayor Brittsan, Councilmen Lois Yochel, George Gleim, John Tompkins, Dave Baylon. Absent: Lucky Gilbreath and Ellis Beeson. Also present City Recorder Grace Millage and Attorney Dames.

Bills were presented, and Gleim made motion, seconded by Tompkins, that bills be paid as presented.

Minutes were read and approved.

Charles Roberts, Chief of Police, gave a brief report on the two local boys hired by the Community Action Council. They will be working for the City cleaning streets, alleys, etc., painting signs also. This is a Government program, and will end September 5th, according to Chief Roberts.

Ordinance #209, Fire Prevention Code was read by Title only. John Tompkins made motion, seconded by Baylon, that this Ordinance be adopted. Carried.

Ordinance #208 was read by Title only. Gleim made motion, seconded by Yochel, that this Ordinance be adopted. It was carried also.

Mayor Brittsan stated that the bid opening by the State regarding J Street, is set for July 27th.

A letter from John Weiser, of Commonwealth, Inc., was read by Attorney Dames. This letter is in regards to preparations being made for Commonwealth, Inc., completing offsite improvements to Christian Acres Unit #3. Mayor Brittsan will contact Mr. Weiser and ask that he notify City as soon as they hear from Mr. Christian regarding the lots owned by Mr. Christian in this Unit, then a special Council meeting will be called to go over this matter with Mr. Weiser.

Mr. Sam Oetinger, of the Planning Commission, presented the following recommendations to Council:

- #1: That the City take action to demolish and removal of the old frame building at 231 Old Pacific Highway, as the building permit is obsolete.
- #2: That all parking be parallel in the City of Talent.
- #3: Amend Trailer Park Ordinance #202 - Section 1, Paragraph B be changed to read as follows: "one or more trailers" to "ten or more."
- #4: Checkered Pig sign: That City write letter to owner of this property about hazardous condition of this sign, and specifying a time limit as to when this should be done.
- #5: Burning of grass: That an Ordinance be made to require owners of all vacant lots to have them burned or cleaned. City should have the streets and city-owned property mowed or burned also.
- #6: Streets & Alleys: That the Council draw up an Ordinance, with the help of the City Engineer, giving specifications for streets, alleys, curbs, gutters and paving of driveways and sidewalks.
- #7: Building Code: That Ordinance #168 "The Building Code for Small Cities, 1964 Revision" be amended to read "Uniform Building Code."

Action taken by Council on the above recommendations:

- #1: John Tompkins was appointed by Mayor to contact owner and get necessary papers signed for the demolishing of this frame structure.
- #2: Mayor appointed Chuck Roberts and Dave Baylon, Sam Oetinger and Gilbreath to get complete details worked out before the next Council meeting in August.
- #3: Tompkins made motion, seconded by Gleim, that the Ordinance #202, Sec. 1, Paragraph B, be changed to read as follows: "one or more trailers" changed to "10 or more." Motion carried unanimously.
- #4: Council agreed that City should write a letter to owner of this property about the hazardous condition of this sign, and specifying a time limit as to when this should be done.

#5: *Burning of grass* Council agreed that property owners be contacted and permission obtained to have the property mowed, then burned by the City. Also they agreed a fee should be presented to property owner covering cost of mowing and burning.

#6: *Ordinance set up giving specifications of streets, alleys, curbs, gutters, etc.* This was tabled for the present.

#7: *Building Code*: Yockel made motion, seconded by Tompkins, that Ordinance #168 be amended to read "Uniform Building Code." Carried unanimously.

John Butler gave a brief report on the property on Wagner Creek Road, belonging to Richard A. Repin. This is in regards to a petition signed by the Repins stating their ^{water} pressure was very low. After checking, John stated that the water pressure was 40 lbs. He also stated that a new meter had been installed on this property.

Mr. Butler also spoke of the need for a new roof on the water tank at the City well next to the Burnette property. Mayor asked that John get bids on this and present at next Council meeting in August.

A tentative date of July 24th was set for the next "Town Hall" meeting, regarding the City water and sewer expansion program.

Meeting adjourned.

POLICE NEWS

Oregon traffic accidents killed 202 people last summer warned Chief Charles Roberts, Talent Police.

"While you're planning your vacation," advised the Chief, "take a few minutes to plan your driving."

Before starting out, have your car checked thoroughly for mechanical defects. Tires, brakes, wheels, lights, horn windshields wipers, and signal devices especially need attention. And, it's a good idea to carry along tools for emergency repairs.

Chief Roberts cautioned motorists to drive defensively as they travel on new and unfamiliar roads. Good drivers allow themselves a "margin of safety". Stay at least one car length behind the car ahead of you for every 10 miles per hour of speed.

"Each driver is required to make about 2,000 split-second decisions daily," said the Chief. "Even occasional lapses in judgement, attention courtesy, or self control could be fatal."

Fasten your seat belts, be alert, courteous, and watch your speed he concluded.
