DISTRICT 4 BUDGET CUT BY \$53,274

Late in September the P-T school board adopted a reduced budget for the 1975-76 school year. It will be voted on Nov. 4 by the district voters. \$53,274 was deleted from the budget turned down Sept. 16. The board approved Nov. 14 as the date the schools will close if the budget does not pass.

The new amount above the 6% limitation is \$1,706,013.

Supt. Anthony Scafani explained that with the deletions the new estimated tax levy would be 15¢ per \$1,000 of assessed valuation less than 1974-75.

Editor's note: I always like this explanation because they don't add that usually the assessed valuation has gone up that year.

DISTRICT 4 TAX RATE REDUCED ERROR FOUND

Discovery of a bookkeeping error has cut 8¢ per thousand dollars from P-T School District 4 property tax levy for bonded indebtedness, as the Jackson Co. Dept. of Assessment & Taxation published tax levy rates for 1975-76.

Chief Deputy Clerk Opal McCartney of the department said the total school levy for Dist. 4, without passage of a budget outside the 6% limitation, will be 77¢ per \$1,000 of assessed valuation instead of 85¢.

But since the reduced amount came in bonded indebtedness accounts instead of operating funds, the newly discovered resource won't affect the size of the district's proposed levy outside the 6% limit. ---Some Talent city residents will pay an additional BCVSA levy between 91¢ & \$1.46.

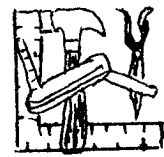

PHOENIX*TALENT BOARD OK'S \$550,000 LOAN

The P-T School board authorized chairman Harold
Compton and Supt. Anthony Scafani to borrow up to
\$550,000 to keep schools open as long as possible.
if voters turn down the proposed \$2.9 million bud-
get on Nov. 4.

The board at its meeting at Talent Elementary
School, authorized the two to apply for the loans
at any of the commercial banks in the Rogue Valley.

Scafani also said that if schools must close
Nov. 14 and can reopen after a successful January
election, the district would have to keep its
schools running until June 30 with no vacation
breaks except for Memorial Day.

The money will be used to to pay up to \$450,000
in unemployment insurance for employes laid off
if schools close Nov. 14 and to keep the schools
open till Nov. 14.

WET WEEK END

Both ends of Talent were inundated with water over the Oct. 11 weekend. A leak in the water line on Foss Road sent a broad stream of water across the road. It was repaired Monday but the safety fence is still up to keep motorists out of the hole that is still soft.

Down by the Lithis Drive In on Creel Lane a Calif. motorist with no insurance and no money according to a city employee hit a fire hydrant in the wee small hours. It broke off and before the water was brought under control the city lost nearly a tank (250,000 gallons) of water. City employees were called the next morning, but since only one was on duty and the rest out of town not much could be done to repair the pipe immediately. But Talent's leaks have been repaired and hopefully will stay that way.

TO DIG OWN WELL

Talent city council granted permission to Roland Alexander to dig his own well at the Tuesday, Oct. 14 meeting.

Because of the city moratorium on construction requiring water connections, Alexander has been unable to build on his property on Old Pacific Highway.

He has agreed to connect to the city water when it becomes available. The well will need to meet state standards before he can purchase a building permit.

FINALLY WE'RE BICENTENNIAL

After four rejected applications, Talent has been designated a bicentennial city.

In a letter accompanying the fifth application, City Recorder Jan Anders wrote: "We hope we have not been too great a disappointment to you, however, the American Revolution took place because of too many government decisions. Perhaps there are a few too many in the certification process which defeats the true bicentennial theme."

The letter was mailed July 21. Either the comment or the application had all its little spaces filled, because the regional American Bicentennial Administration, in Seattle, has decided to include Talent on the bicentennial roster.

COMMENT I wonder how many Am. Revolutionary fighters there would have been if it had taken 5 applications in triplicate to get on the Minuteman roster. Regarding this, I didn't notice any of the 'boys' who served in the armed forces from WWI on having to fill out all these forms to get in. Personally I think any American town is a Bicentennial town.

SHOT IN ARM WHILE HUNTING
