POST OFFICE TO REMAIN IN TALENT

Well due to financial reasons, the boiling pot of the Talent post office removal has cooled down to a simmer.

Operating the Talent Post Office as a branch of the Ashland office and offering delivery service would be more expensive than leaving it independent, Postal Service officials estimate.

Based on the cost factor, Medford section al Postmaster Al Bradford said this month he didn't think it likely that the postal service would downgrade the Talent office from its independent status to make it a branch of the Ashland office.

Bradford said he refigured the cost of the proposed change. He came up with estimates showing that operating the office as a branch and offering in-city delivery service in Talent would cost about \$8,500 a year more than leaving the status quo.

The Postal Service originally proposed the change after Talent Postmaster Alice Thoresan retired in December.

Bradford said the proposal has been sent along to the district office of the Postal Service in Portland, but he doubted that the district office would even send it on to the regional office in San Francisco

TALENT MAY TRY TO HIRE ASHLAND CONSULTANT

Talent will try to hire the consultant in the Ashland watershed study in hopes of possibly finding another water source.

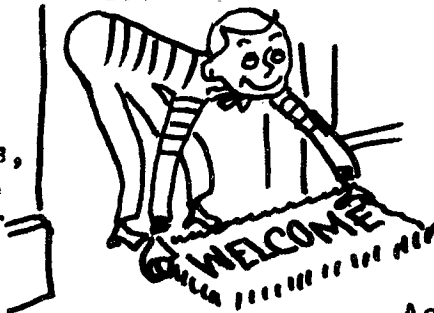
Talent City Mayor Richard Henry and City Engineer Walt Marquess met recently with Ashland City Administrator Brian Almquist and Public Works Director Al Alsing as well as consultant, Jay Montgomery of Boise, Idaho.

Montgomery said he could see no problem in doing some work for Talent, Alsing and Almquist agreed, Marquess said.

Marquess plans to meet with Montgomery within the next month to discuss a work program for the study. At the time, a cost estimate will be made, which will be presented to the Talent City Council at their Feb. 10 meeting.

Talent will have to pay the entire cost of its share of the study, if a contract, since there are no federal funds available to help the city.

Federal funds helped build the Patio Village retirement complex, but the federal government has failed so far to solve the strain on Talent's water system caused by that complex.

FIRE DISTRICT 5 SETTING UP RESCUE SQUAD

Customers of Jackson County Fire District 5, formerly Talent Rural Fire Dept., will receive more for their money within the next two months.

Chief Max Long said last week the fire department plans to start an "intermediate rescue squad" capable of performing several rescue functions.

Because of lack of funds and trained personnel, he said the rescue service would not be as comprehensive as the Rescue 9 unit in Ashland; although 4 firefighters have certification as emergency medical technicians.

The rescue unit will use the dept. small pumper and serve as a "quick attack" unit, to meet emergencies. It will begin fire suppression activities while the rest of the unit is reaching the fire. The cost of starting the new program is about \$2,000. He has scheduled his certified medical personnel so that there is one on each shift.

The program was approved by the department's board of directors in mid January.

Talent City recorder Jan Anders warned
the city council Jan 13 of the increas-
ing strain on the city's finances.

Most of the city's property taxes are
paid for the year and the city can ex-
pect about \$2,000 and \$3,000 more in
revenue from that source. This is about
\$3,600 short of the expected \$22,205.

Also the city water dept will find it
hard to make ends meet, which is requir-
ed by ordinance, if not this year then
next. The state's and the federal new
water quality regulations will severely

Mrs. Jo Howell and family

from the Diary of Welborn Beeson Jan. 4, 1853, Tuesday--I attended school for the last time for a good while. It is examination day. The Trustees and several of the Neighbors came in to hear the lessons.

Jan. 5, Wednesday--The winter Term commenced today but as I do not intend to attend it I prepared to be ready to go home as I expected Father up to take me home. He came at noon he staid to hear the Compositions and Declarations. We then started for home I bidding Adieu to Farm Ridge and Its Citizens for a quite awhile. We got home by four o' clock. Found Mother well.

Jan. 6, Thursday--Father and I hauled one of load of wood. We then went across the Vermilion River to a sale at Sam Hall's from there went to Todd's store and bought a pair of boots for me and a dress for Mother. We heard that Mr. Browne is dead. Poor Fellow he was preparing to go with us to Oregon. We crossed the river on the ice above the dam, in the evening I went to Andrew Kirkpatrick's to collect some money he was owing us.

Jan. 7, Friday--Mother and I went to Ottawa. We found the roads good the town was full of teams. We bought things for our Oregon fit out. I bought a rifle of Brunner paid him \$16.00 for it. I shall call it Maud Victory.

Jan. 8, Saturday--Father and I hauled 3 loads of wood. It commenced to rain at noon. I went to the post office and got five papers.

Jan. 10, Monday--In the morning we killed two hogs. I shot them with my new rifle. Mr. Ward & Toole helped us to butcher. In the afternoon we cut them up and salted them they are to take with us on our Origion journey.

Jan. 11, Tuesday--It rains this morning. We helped Mother render the fat.

Jan. 13, Tuesday--Mr. Bristol came to see us. he brought 6 papers & 2 letters for us. One of the letters was from William Laughlin a young man from Grandville that intends going in company with us to Origion.

Jan. 19--About noon William Laughlin came up to our house to inform us there is to be a meeting of all those going to Origion at Cedar Point next Saturday week. In the evening we hauled a load of wood. John Kirkpatrick came up to invite us to a raising of a leg cabin he is building near the old lime kiln.

Jan. 20--Father went to Mill. I went to the raising. There was 13 men attend ed. We got it nearly raised. We had an excelent dinner and some good apples.

Jan. 22--Father went across the Vermillion river which was dangerous crossing on the ice to see if Charles Toss would buy our farm. He said he would think about it when he comes back from St. Luis.

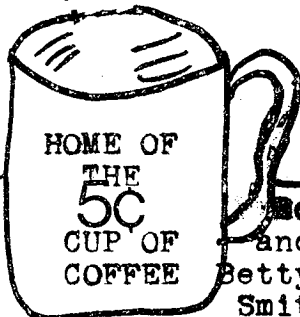

SCHOOL BUDGET CUT

P-T Schools supt. Anthony Scafani presented the district committee with \$186,874 in cuts from the budget they have been working on. The committee had asked for Scafani's recommendation on budget items at the committee's last meeting.

Scafani said today the budget now is \$3,093,457--\$131,486 more than last year's \$2,962,038 budget. The difference is 4.43% greater than last year's.
