ARE TALENT'S WATER PROBLEMS SOLVED

State, federal and local officials met recently in an attempt to resolve problems of access to water stored in the Talent Irrigation system by the City of Talent.

The city was notified as was TID that water rights issued to the federal Bureau of Reclamation upon construction of Howard Prairie, Hyatt and Emigrant Reservoirs don't include municipal uses by the state.

Water rights, according to count Water Master Dave Hendrix, covered only irrigation & power generation uses.

Notified of the problem, the bureau said the state should amend the original water rights to include municipal uses. The state demurred New water rights were needed, according to James Sexson, director of the Water Resources Dept.

Jebousek said the bureau was concerned that the permit should be amended to protect the city's rights to water. Water rights on stored water, however, aren't as subject to seasonal cutbacks as are rights on stream water.

The bureau will file a new water right request. After it is received, it will be open to public comment for 30 days. It appears the city will have water rights to divert water unless someone protests against it.

Basically, the TID water is fully contracted by other users. There may be some question about the availability of water.

Hendrix commented that not all the TID water is being used in most years. Even during the drought year of 1977 there was a storage surplus in the system at the end of the year.

As the city's needs increase with development of homes, the needs for irrigation will lessen as acreage changes use.

KRUGER NAMED NEW FIRE CHIEF

The city has chosen Owen "Ike" Kruger as its first full-time paid fire chief. He began his new job August 15.

Eight persons applied for the job. Kruger has been a member of Talent's volunteer fire dept. for 10 years. He was volunteer Assistant chief for six years and volunteer chief for about three years. There are 18 members in the department and would like 10 or 15 more especially people who are home during the day.

LOCAL MAN INJURED

Randy Sneed, 19 was seriously injured recently when he fell through a press roller at Sierra Building Supply, Houston Rd., Phoenix.

His leg was amputated Aug 15. Sneed had just started work at Sierra Building Supply, according to a spokesperson. The roller he fell through is used for making trusses.

Jackson District 5 firefighters provided emergency treatment at the scene before he was taken to the hospital by Medford Ambulance.

TALENT GROWING FASTER THAN PROJECTED

Talent is growing faster than its planners have projected.

The city has approved mobile home parks and subdivisions that could add about 766 residents to the Nov. 1977 census of 2,615, which is the population levels projected for 1983 according to Associate Planner Karen Sinclair.

City council and Planning Commission have projected a population of 6,748 by 2000AD. This is an average yearly growth rate of 4.2%.

Comprehensive plan data prepared by planner Dave Doerter says the new Bear Creek Treatment plant scheduled for completion by November, will support a population of 4,563. When that figure is reached, the plant should be expanded by a 1,000,000 gallons a day capacity.

With the accelerated growth rate, the station will have to be expanded sooner than planned.
