GROW TH BAN LIFTED BY CITY FATHERS

After the City Council decided not to extend the 90-day stoppage on development in the city, growth activity resumed.

The moratorium until after the recent election allowing the citizens to vote on a budget levy, which included what the council saw as the answer to their problems; a new city administrator position; but the voters rejected the extra money for the position.

The council then decided to seek a "Contract planner" to handle current planning matters. Developers will pay the planner a consulting fee.

The job will be advertised and the planner recommended to the council by its Labor Relations Board.

Consultation fees will be set by the planner and paid by the developer to the city. The city in turn will pay the planner through revolving accounts

DOERTER GIVES GROWTH OPTIONS

Planner Dave Doerter sees Talent as a ruralagricultural bedroom community, with little
job base, low-income residents, possibly a
shifting center of trade and with a potential
for growth---those are some of the descriptions
of this city he put forth in a preliminary
study of economic status and future policies.

Doerter's presentation was based on community attitude studies and other work he has done in preparing the city's comprehensive plan.

Feedback from those present at the meeting will be considered as he works to complete the comprehensive plan, Doerter said.

He began his discussion with a description of Talent's liabilities anamely

- --Population made up primarily of older persons--a low percentage of children.
- ---Education level of the average citizen is lower than the state average.
- ---Most residents work in larger communities nearby; those who hold local jobs are generally paid at a rate near the poverty level.
 ---Trade and service enterprises, generally secondary types of employment are primary in Talent.

WILL FILE COUNTER-LAWSUIT

The city council voted Oct.9 to allow City Attorney Roy Bashaw to file a counter-claim in Jackson County Circuit Court against a construction firm which lodged a \$10,500 suit against the city last week.; and to negotiate with the attorney of another man who is seeking \$5,142.54 from the city.

Ausland Const., Grants Pass claims they were over penalized for a late completion date.

Several phone calls called our attention to an article in the Daily Tidings on a report of a meeting chaired by Dave Doerter, City planner. He began his discussion with descriptions of Talent's liabilities: the population madeup of primarily older persons -a low % of children. The average citizens education lower than state average, he said. (Note) If we have a low % of children-why do we have 3 1st grades? Why if kids are so scarce do we need not 1 but 3 new schools? And as for the education level is concerned How do you Know? Let's look around us---We have a State Senator, Lynn Newbry, who served 6 yrs in the Senate and is now advisor to MEDco. How about our Drs., teachers, and yes the man in the street. Look around the town and don't think for 1 minute that the people of Talent are the Yessir sort. They believe in careful consideration of all issues. Mr. Doerter, may feel he is taking an unbiased viewpoint in the comprehensive plan for Talent, since he is not directly paid by Talent tax funds; but since his salary is paid by state and federal funds, he is still paid by taxes paid by local citizenry, but of course, we are all biased one way or anther and this shows in our actions.

Why do we, a small town need a planner, simply because the state requires it. Our city council, I believe, have the Smarts to plan for what is left of the Town of Talent.

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ALENT NEWS FLASHES DERTER GIVES GROWTH OPTIONS cont. from front page The economic outlook is good, depending on how you look at, he says. "If we can get the industrial park going, we'll have a manufacturing base. More economic opportunities will be coming to Talent."

But Doerter and others present warned that economic growth must be watched carefully in order to comply with the wishes of most residents---to keep small town flavor.

The commission and audience eventually agreed that some economic growth would be desirable, so tax burdens on property owners might be eased.

Those present agreed that during the first stages of construction at the new industrial park on Talent Avenue, the city might have to "take what you can get" in order to establish an Economic Threshold; but they would not consent to trade-offs which would bring in businesses with adverse environmental impacts.

It was also agreed that Talent should try to serve "tourism spillover" from Ashland and Medford; that a shift of a "downtown shopping center" from the civic center toward proposed shopping center sites along Highway 99 be allowed; that service offices, such as doctors, dentists and banks would be encouraged to locate near the civic center of town rather than in the shopping centers; and that measures to ensure the aesthetic quality of Talent would be enforced.
