PARAMEDIC FINANCING TO BE CONSIDERED

City council will consider financial support for a valleywide paramedic district at their January meeting.

Curt Charley, emergency medical services coordinator for Jackson County explained how the district could be set up at the last council meeting.

The paramedics would provide backup life-saving services for emergency medical technicians who are now working with the various fire districts.

Paramedics would provide medication and shock treatment for heart attack victims. They would be stationed in the north, central and south areas in the valley.

All cities from Ashland to Eagle Point are being asked to support a five-year serial levy for beginning expenses. This would mean that the owner of a \$55,000 home would pay about \$20 a year.

Don Grimes suggested the district might be financed by public subscription as is Mercy Flights. (The only thing wrong with this is that it might take too long to see if the emergency seeker is covered or not and could or could not be treated that the emergency would be over and they could just call the funeral director.)

The council decided to send a letter to the Jackson County Board of Commissioners supporting the county's recommended improvement of Suncrest Road as a major arterial.

The council will write to the county commissioners urging that agricultural lands surrounding Talent be maintained as a buffer area to keep Talent separated from Ashland and Phoenix.

At their meeting last week, the Talent Planning Commission members said they do not want one massive urban area in which Phoenix, Talent and Ashland would connect.

The council decided to give employees a \$10. Christmas gift instead of the usual turkey as has been done before.

REPORTS FROM LEAGUE OF OREGON CITIES MEETING

New people coming into a city should pay their fair share of the costs of running a city, Councilman Dee Swearington reported from the meeting. The League speakers recommended means of assessing new developments such as land exchange costs, land transfer charges and systems development charges. Such assessments would pay for increased costs of city capitol improvements, he said, things like water treatment and street improvements.

He said such means of paying for expansion of city services work well in other places.

PLANNERS WORK

Planners recently agreed that the city's growth within the urban growth boundary should be directed in a southerly and southeasterly direction from existing development west of Oregon 99.

Exceptions would be the lands west of the Talent Irrigation District canal north of the intersection with Wagner and land west of Wagner Creek but south of its intersection with the irrigation canal.

To follow such a course, Dave Doerter, the city's contract comprehensive planner, suggested an amendment to the joint city-county urbanization policies adopted in 1978.

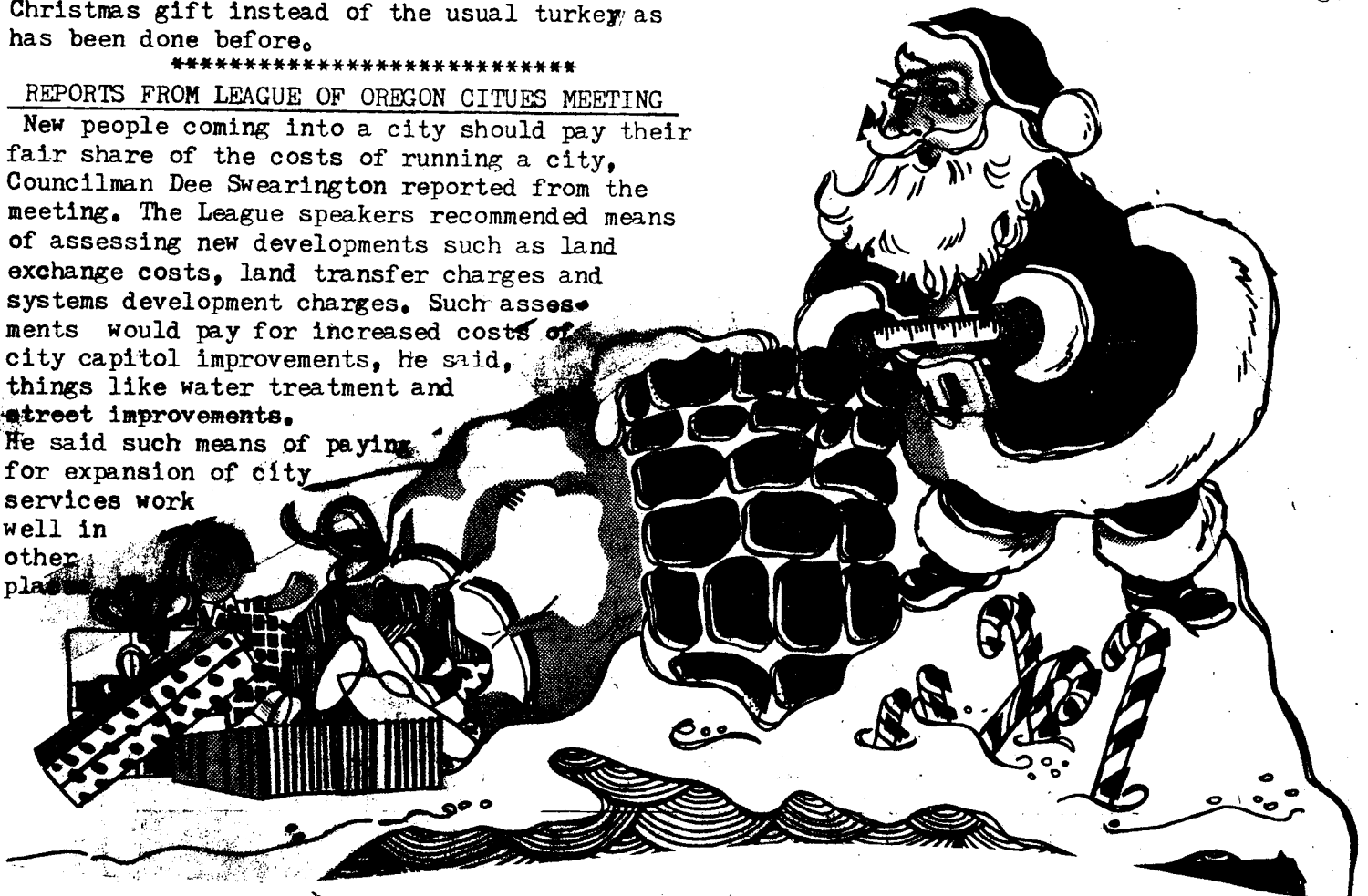
With such an amendment, all urban growth boundary extensions notwithstanding the stated direction of urban growth wouldn't be considered without a policy change.

---Recently during a discussion of a proposed housing policies section in the new city comprehensive plan, the commissioners cut back the plan's projected population for the 2,000--from 6,800 to 6,000.

Doerter said the city's consulting engineer, Walt Marquess, predicts that Talent will have enough water to supply a 5,300 population by the year 2000.

"I think we should decrease the population projection and increase the density," Penny Barker said.

Discussing the proposed housing policies, Doerter said Talent does not have its fair share of multiple family housing. The average city in the metropolitan area has 27% of its housing in multiple family development. Talent has 16%. It does have its fair share of middle and low income housing.

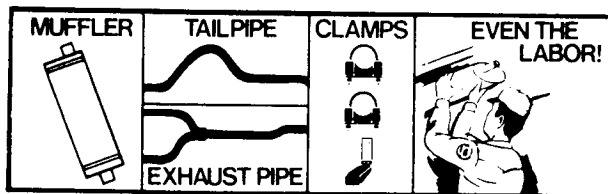

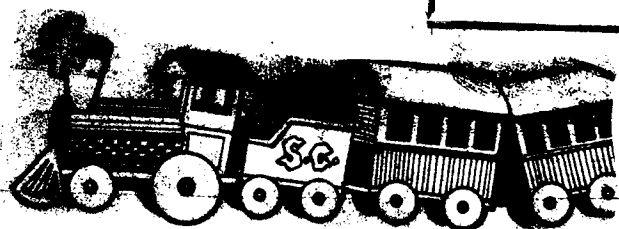

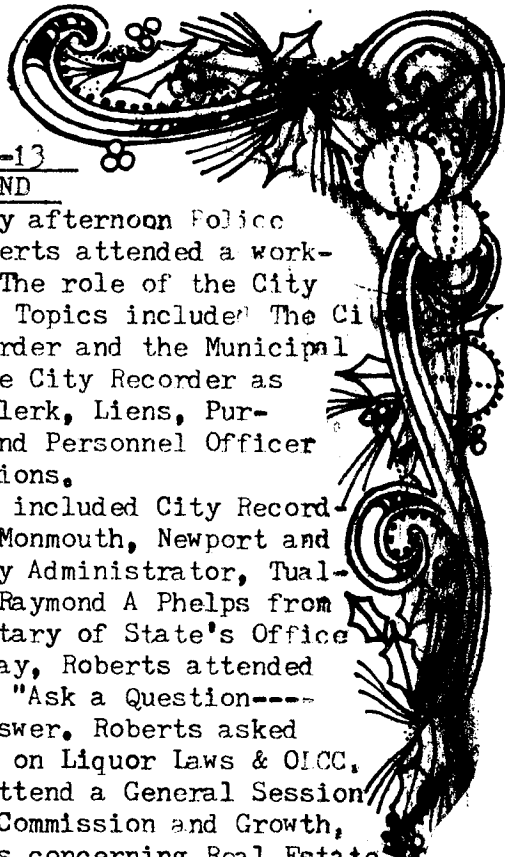
Speakers included City Recorders from Monmouth, Newport and Bend, City Administrator, Tualitan and Raymond A Phelps from the Secretary of State's Office

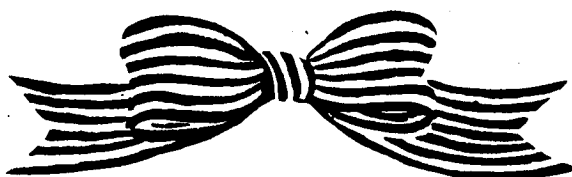
