TALENT HIRES NEW ATTORNEY

The Talent City Council Aug. 19 approved the hiring of a new city attorney. Michael H. Arant a Medford attorney, was hired on a unanimous decision of the council. The city agreed to enter into an employment contract with Arant which what is expected of both parties. Former City Attorney Ron Salter resigned effective Aug. 1.

Several Talent residents appeared in support of teen-ager skateboarders in the city. They requested the city's help for a place for users of skateboarders. The city has received many complaints from residents about skateboarders on the streets and using skateboard ramps in the streets.

After hearing a spokesman ask if the teen-agers could use the city parks, Mayor Frank Falsarella and the council said the liability insurance would be too steep to cover them in case of an accident.

Falsarella and the council suggested the delegation go to the Phoenix-Talent School Board with a formal request to use the grounds at Talent Elementary School.

After hearing Police Chief Dale Kinnan's report, the council, with a dissenting vote by Councilman Jim Bergren, gave permission to install a street light in the 300 block of Rapp Road. An assessment of the area showed there was a high amount of foot traffic there after dark, making an additional street light necessary.

The intersection of Rapp Road and Talent Ave also brought on a heated argument on a four-way stop sign. Rapp road is a county road and already has two stop signs in both directions; but one stop sign is partially blocked by a driveway.

With two votes against stop signs (Roberts & Bergren) the council decided to put stop signs on Talent Ave. for a trial period of 120 days.

The council and the new city attorney heard a question from former Fire Chief Iker on the matter of his layoff from the Fire Dept. in an earlier budget cutting move.

Councilwoman Greiner said his layoff was within the rights of the Council and the city was not obligated to hire him back when the Talent services levy was passed.

Greiner said 20-22 applications were reviewed and they made the best choice for the city.

Kruger disagreed and said he is planning to meet with the Labor Bureau.

Robert Rislow proposed a simplification of the weed control ordinance. It referred to the city attorney.

Safety hazards of abandoned mobile home on Lani and Deborah Drive was brought up by residents. This is a case of absentee landlords. Referred to the city attorney.

Larger water main to increase water capacity in case of fire requested by Fairview Drive resident Emmett Walden. City Administrator/Recorder Tony Faxon said some additional city money may be available to pay for this project in the future.

PHOENIX TALENT SCHOOL PLANS START MOVING

Phoenix-Talent school district officials are meeting the challenges of urban-growth boundaries, bond sales and swimming pools.

The board plans to spend up to \$10 million on a state-of-the-art high school and up to \$2.5 million to remodel the existing schools into one or two middle schools. The money was approved by district voters in November, and since then two subcommittees have been looking into which grades will be in which schools, what will be taught and how the existing buildings can best be used.

A big issue in the project is whether to have a middle school or junior high and whether to remodel existing facilities for one or two of these schools. The middle school grades 6 through 8 seems to be in favor now.

Up for debate is whether or not to have the high school under one roof or opt for campus effect.

The district plans to build the high school on the 40-A site on Colver Road; but that plan is contingent on the approval of county planners and the city of Talent, which would have to annex the lot into its urban growth boundary.

The Talent City Council recently informally agreed to waive the district's annexation fees, knowing the school's location there will boost the city's finances over the years. But the city may have to reconsider as the fees total about \$17,400.

Local fruit growers have withdrawn their objections to the Colver Road site, which borders at least two orchards. The district agreed to put up fences to keep students out of the orchards and will discuss orchard spraying schedules so the school and growers won't interfere with each other.

PHOENIX TALENT BOARD SELECT

The Phoenix-Talent School board appointed Rick Minear to replace Jan Purkeypile to the school board.

Purkeypile is moving to Shady Cove. She has served three years on the board.

Minear is a radiological technologist and served on the Board's reorganization subcommittee and Orchard Hill Parent Teacher Organization. The term runs through June 30, 1988.

The School Board also adopted goals for 1987-88 for the board, district and superintendent. The goals include effective reorganization, construction and/or remodeling of district schools and providing effective programs in AIDS prevention.

The hope is to have a policy in place so if they have a youngster with AIDS, they can calmly handle it instead of having a panic situation.


